# Impact

## In 2021, HawaiiKidsCAN...



secured **3 legislative wins**, including expanding computer science to all kids in K-12 schools, improving data reporting for career readiness programs and codifying a plan to close the digital divide by 2030.



provided free internet to **more than 1,500 keiki and community members** across four islands to increase access to distance learning through our WiFi on Wheels connectivity portfolio, which has garnered recognition from organizations such as the PIE Network, WiFiForward and Hawaii Children's Action Network.



launched Lanai 'Ohana Pods, which provided **\$15,000 in microgrants** to **140 participants**, including 86 students (ages ranging from toddlers to 17 years) and 54 parents.



partnered with Ceeds of Peace and Pacific and Asian Affairs Council to launch Youth Action Alliance Hawaii, a collaborative seven-month virtual youth program that served **28 youths from 17 schools across 3 islands**.



influenced the conversation around education and what our kids need through **42 media hits**, including primetime TV news interviews and an appearance on a PBS Hawaii roundtable discussion on school reopening with local education leaders.



stayed on the frontlines of policy discussions all year at the Hawaii State Board of Education as a "voice of reason," with **17 pieces of testimony** on topics including Hawaii's federal ESSER plan, student learning loss, school reopening and summer school.



was fueled by community support, including **151 total donors in 2021: 129 individuals and 22 foundations, funds and businesses**.

# Innovations paving the way to the future of Hawaii education:



HawaiiKidsCAN was proud to host the national 50CAN 10th Anniversary Summit in Honolulu in December. We brought together education advocates and leaders to explore innovation such as a visit to Mānoa Heritage Center with students from Voyager Public Charter School.

David was part of a live panel conversation in July for an episode of INSIGHTS on PBS Hawaii. Yunji De Nies moderated this live conversation that included leaders from the Hawaii Department of Education, State Board of Education, and Hawaii State Teachers Association.

We co-hosted our third annual Spark & Inspire education innovation showcase with Teach For America Hawaii. Big changes this year included our first student presentation team and a hybrid format that created a virtual beach festival via Gather.

We've loved seeing how families are stepping up in creative ways to support their kids through the Lanai Ohana Pods program. One set of families purchased STEM learning kits so kids can meet up in the town's central park to do experiments.

### Innovations paving the way to the future of Hawaii education:

[The town of Keanae is] an isolated community where people can now go online for services. [WiFi] opens opportunities for internet sales and keeps jobs going for those working online. Students are using it. It keeps the kids up-to-date and helps them with school projects. [With limited broadband availability,] the locals have been using the WiFi on Wheels and are very happy to have it. Some use the program on a regular basis and one lady, who takes classes online, uses it twice a week. When they lost power in one part of town, several folks came down and packed the [church where WiFi on Wheels is located]. It is good to know that it has been well worth the effort.
